## GOOD-BYE FROM DR. BROM

Dear Members,

This will be my final Dr. Brom article and my final newsletter issue as editor. I will be chasing other dreams from this point on. I do not believe in keeping the same editor for a long period of time as they tend to get "set in their ways". Tina Severson, who is stepping down as President, will be filling the editor position but in another format and the change will do us all good.

I have enjoyed answering your questions during the past 32 months. I have learned a lot through my research and hope you have too. Together we have explored plant pests, fertilization, landscape bromeliads, how to use bromeliads in floral displays, bromeliad classification and nomenclature, birds and bromeliads, where bromeliad names come from, new subfamilies and new genera based on DNA research, how bromeliads are judged at a show, native bromeliads, how to tell Tillandsias apart, caring for bromeliads in the heat and the cold, hurricane protection for our plants, preventing root rot, botanical gardens of Florida, and more. 

### EARTH FRIENDLY REPLACEMENTS FOR PEAT MOSS

If you are like most of our members, you are using peat moss in your bromeliad pots. Peat moss is ideal for the good drainage bromeliads need. However there is a current debate over whether using peat moss is bad for the environment.

Peat moss comes from peat bogs located mostly in Canada and Russia. Some believe that peat bogs are as important as rain forests. They prevent flooding, purify water and absorb carbon dioxide. They are being harvested at a rapid rate. Harvesting them releases carbon into the atmosphere thereby contributing to a warmer climate.

Peat bogs are also a native habitat for birds, reptiles, insects and small animals. It takes centuries for a harvested peat bog to recover. Therefore harvesting them is non sustainable. England is banning peat moss starting in 2024.

There are several alternatives available although, as with many environmentally friendly replacements, they might be cost prohibitive, especially at a commercial level. Try them on just a few plants at first to see how effective they are.

It is recommended that these products be blended with peat moss at a one part replacement product to two parts peat moss.


Hydrafiber is made from recycled wood products. PittMoss is a recycled cardboard product. These products also come preblended with peat moss. Other alternatives are cocopeat or coco coir, composted manure, and leaf mold. Many are available at Amazon or Lowe's. Hydrafiber has its own website.
