Publications for sale – from Australia
As part of our effort to provide information about bromeliads, we will have some basic culture publications available for sale at the regular monthly meetings. Currently, we offer the most recent (2003) edition of Bromeliads, A Cultural Manual published by the Bromeliad Society International. At a price of \$3, this manual provides a good introduction for anyone just beginning to develop an interest in the plants of this family. It covers basic culture, and gives more detailed information on some of the commonly cultivated genera. There are also a sufficient number of enticing color photographs to stimulate your desire to learn more.

A more advanced introduction is provided by Starting with Bromeliads, a publication of the Bromeliad Society of Queensland. This is a larger book, and covers cultural techniques that go well beyond the basic. One of the best features of this book is the large number of color photographs of bromeliads grown in Australia. We sell it for \$20.

For those interested in studying bromeliads in depth, we have some complete year sets of the Journal of the Bromeliad Society. The Journal provides a running history of bromeliad cultivation with articles ranging from cultural tips to stories of adventure in the search for bromeliads to descriptions of newly found species. Journals published between 1976 and 1989 are available for \$7 each year. Journals published from 1990 afterwards are \$10 each year.

About the Cathcarts

Oct. 3, 2006--MANATEE -- They have traveled to more than 25 countries collecting rare species of plants. In the process Dennis Cathcart has broken a vertebrae in his neck and been hit by a falling boulder. She has had a gun held to her head and had scorpions covering her hands. While sweet-talking their way past border patrols and meeting head-hunters in Borneo, they have also discovered many new plant species. Three even have their name. But some people still do not know about Dennis and Linda Cathcart and their business Tropiflora, which celebrated its 30th anniversary this weekend. "We've had some crazy adventures," said Dennis, 58. "We've been bitten and stung by all kinds of things. It's a way of life; it's not just a business."

At Tropiflora on Tallevast Road, the Cathcarts have around 6,000 species of rare and exotic plants, including orchids and bromeliads. Bromeliads are their specialty, and they have more than 4,000 species of those. The nursery carries plants native to South and Central America and also creates its own hybrids on site. The Cathcarts have three types of customers: those from the mail-order list, local landscapers and people who buy them and sell them at weekend markets. One-third of the plants are sold wholesale and the rest are sold retail.

He compared his business model to organized chaos. "From the outside it looks like stuff is flying everywhere," he said. "But then they produce a really nice product for a good price." "A few years ago, before the hurricanes, the business was at its peak and sales were bumping at around \$1 million," Dennis said. "We're at around \$1 million now, but we should be a lot higher."

The owners' children have no interest in taking on the business, the Cathcarts said, but they are making plans to structure the company so it continues on after them. "It would be a shame for it to close down," Dennis said. Their daughter, Robin, 33, is married to a chiropractor and has two children. Their son, Scott, 30, has a degree in history and manages a Moe's Southwest Grill. "We're not selling the land or the nursery, so I keep hoping," said Linda, 59.
